

The Beautiful Shawl Project (BSP)

July 2021 to June 2022

Over July 2021 to June 2022, BreastScreen Victoria and the Victorian Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation (VACCHO) collaborated with 12 Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations (ACCOs) to bring cultural screening shawls and accessible breast screens to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women.

shawls were distributed to ACCOs

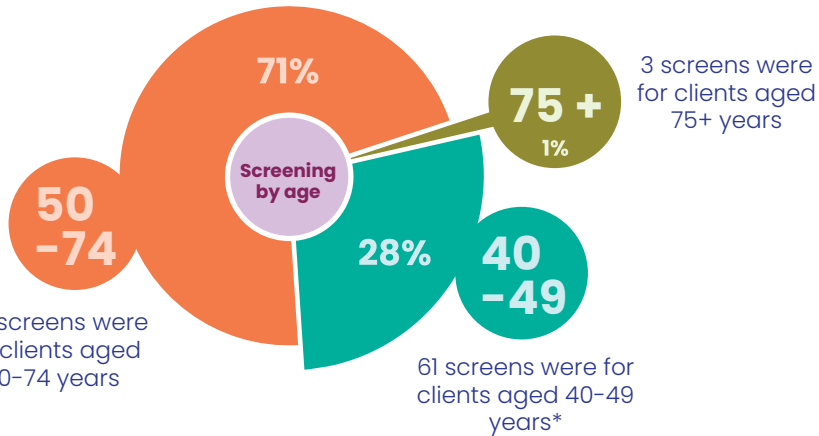
"It was deadly.

219 219 screens were provided to Aboriginal clients as part of the BSP

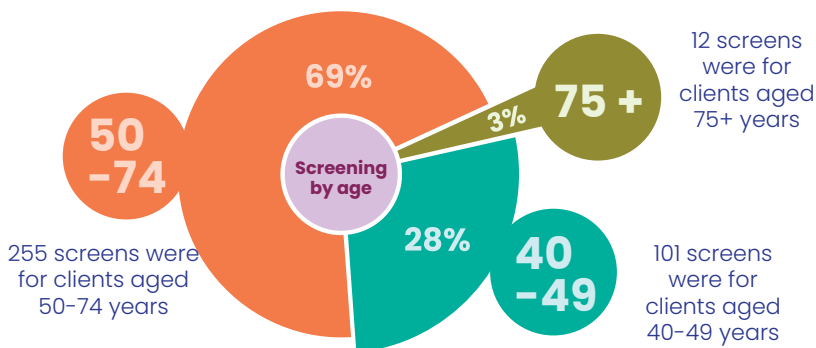

(Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal* clients)

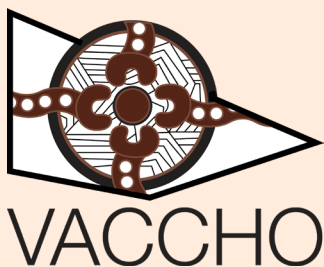
368 a total of 368 screens were provided to all clients as part of the BSP
